We have had a really fun and busy term in Reception learning about Traditional Tales and People who help us. We also enjoyed World Book Day, Well-being week and Science week.




















In Nursery this term, we have enjoyed making the most of the colder weather by investigating ice and how it changes. We have also explored our topic of transport which we have continued in forest school as well.

We have had World Book Day, Science week and worked really hard and had lots of fun practising and performing our production of Peter Pan!




















The pictures above show you a variety of what we have been learning this term. We have painted silhouettes, learnt about Anglo Saxons and even been on a mini-beast hunt!

We would like to say a huge well done to Jack in Year 3/4 for winning the BBC Sounds Rising Talent 8-11 year old category of the Young Audio Awards! This is such an amazing achievement and a well-deserved acknowledgement for all his hard work; we are all so very proud of him!

Jack began his podcast, Jack To The Future, during lockdown in 2021 following a short stint on a local radio station. The fortnightly podcast is all about the future and making predictions about what may happen. Jack interviews a range of children and adults from different walks of life. The podcast was one year old at the end of March and to date, Jack has spoken to over 28 adults and children about lots of different topics- from the future of reading, mental health, English, Maths to recycling, sustainable clothing, food and deforestation.

John Drewery

It is with great sadness that we share the news of the sudden passing of Mr John Drewery, a truly dedicated Wheatcroft Governor.

John had been involved with Wheatcroft for over 20 years, since his eldest son began his Wheatcroft journey. John's three children were pupils of the school and during their early years of education, John was an active member of the PTFA and could be seen at many functions, sometimes juggling, which was a hobby he and his younger son enjoyed together.

Through his work as an architect, John spent the majority of his career working on school projects; he brought these skills and knowledge to the Governing body on which he served for many years on the resources committee and later as Chair and Vice Chair. He would give experienced and astute comments to proposals for changes to the building and would be full of questions to contractors, architects and builders using his insightful knowledge to ensure this helped Wheatcroft to improve the provision for our children.

John believed learning should be interesting and enjoyable and he was keen to support active and outdoor learning, caring very much about the environment. He spent several weeks over the years accompanying school Journeys to Norfolk, Wales and the Isle of Wight. He brought his own extensive wildlife knowledge and enthusiasm to many activities and was infamous for his dancing at the disco on the Year 6 journey, identifying wild birds, juggling and circus skills.

John will be remembered dearly by all Wheatcroft staff, past and present, as a generous, caring and enthusiastic member of the Governing body whose commitment and engagement really helped support the leadership team at Wheatcroft.
